

Featured recent aquisitions



Sophia (Beckwith) Marsh: A New Portrait in Fredericton's Museum Collection

We are very pleased to announce that the Fredericton Region Museum was recently gifted an outstanding portrait, attributed to A. G. Hoit, of Sophia (Beckwith) Marsh (1802-1851). Sophia was born in Fredericton, the daughter of Planter (pre-Loyalist) Nehemiah Beckwith and Julie-Louise Lebrun de Duplessis. She was the great-grandmother of Ella Duff Good, whose husband (G. Alvah Good) and father-in-law (Frank A. Good) were founding members of the Society and museum.

Born into a family of wealth and privilege, Sophia Beckwith's life was not without heartache, since her father drowned under suspicious circumstances when she was 13 years of age. Sophia and her sister, Julia C. Beckwith, left Fredericton sometime soon after, eventually taking up residence with their widowed aunt, Elizabeth (Lebrun de Duplessis) Ferland, in Kingston (Upper Canada). In 1824, Sophia married John Lothrop Marsh II (1796-1853), a native of Wakefield, NB. Their marriage took place in Quebec City, in the Cathedral of the Holy Trinity, with witnesses being Sophia's sister, Julia C. Hart, and brother, John A Beckwith. That same year, Julia published her first book, St. Ursula's Convent, or the Nun of Canada, making her Canada's first novelist.

By 1842 Sophia and John Marsh had returned to Fredericton, where they were raising eight children. John was a successful merchant in the city and is credited with establishing the first steam-powered sawmill in Fredericton in 1845, the Beckwith Marsh Mill, located on the west end of Queen Street (present-day 215 Queen).

By July of 1846, the Marsh mill was sawing 50,000 board feet of deals a day (Squires, 83). One of Sophia's sons, John Lothrop Marsh III, became a Fredericton's police magistrate; while one of her daughters, Sophia Adelaide, became the mother of Major General Hugh Havelock McLean (Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick from 1928 to 1935).

This portrait of Sophia (Beckwith) Marsh is attributed to well-known New England portraitist Albert Gallatin Hoit (1809-1856), who visited Fredericton in 1837, 1838, and 1848. During those visits, A.G. Hoit completed several portrait commissions, some of which are now in the collection of the Fredericton Region Museum. Although we cannot be certain when the artist completed Sophia's portrait, he does leave some fascinating clues about life in Fredericton. During the fall of 1848 he enjoyed the hospitality of Colonel George Shore and his wife Ariana (Saunders), who was herself an avid artist:

I am staying at the house of Col Shore, with whom and his family I formed a very intimate acquaintance when here before – On my arrival here they insisted upon my taking up my abode at once with them as in my then delicate state I was hardly comfortable at the indifferent hotel at which I was staying... Theirs is one of the finest families here and Col S. one of the leading men of the Province – Mrs Shore is quite an amateur artist and a great lover of Painting (Rosenfeld, 53).

Albert G Hoit established his place of business in Colonel Shore's home (today known as the Bliss Carman house on Shore Street), as well as in another location that was about one mile away in the city

I have a horse brought to the door at 7 o'clock and ride for an hour – then breakfast. After breakfast take my sittings on the portraits 'til one o'clock – then take lunch – then I am carried up to town where I work 'til after 5. They then send for me and I get home in time for dinner which is served at 6 o'clock (Ibid, 53).

This portrait donation from the collection Dr. Ella Duff Good represents a very generous gift to Fredericton by Patricia and Heidi Good. It also represents a fine addition to the museum's current collection of five other confirmed Hoit portraits: Benjamin Wolhaupter (1969.3510.1), Asa Holly Coy (1969.3517.1), Sarah Peters Wetmore (1969.51.1), Letitia Ann Smith (1980.15.1), and Mary Ann Coy (1969.2208.1). We will be seeking assistance for restoration work later this fall.



Soldier's Record Book – 1300 Pte. Giles Osgood, 1/22nd Regiment of Foot

This "Soldier's Record Book" is a very interesting and scarce document although every soldier had one. Not many have survived! The cover page reads "Monthly Settlements, Clothing Account and Savings Bank Account". There is a separate section for the Pay Account. While a copy of a soldier's records was held by the unit, this was the soldier's personal copy. It served as a backup to the unit records, a very useful thing in a time when fires, shipwrecks and countless other misfortunes could destroy the unit records.

The document is wrapped in linen for protection and contains several printed pages. It starts with general information. There is a section that emphasises the need to keep this book safe because it provides a record of the "proper settlement of Pay, Allowance and Clothing" and could be used after discharge to verify a number of things such as a Pension. Clearly, a very valuable document. It lists the rewards for good conduct, pension benefits, extra rewards for meritorious service, etc. The book was printed by Ford & Tilt, London, for Her Majesty's Stationary Office in 1861.

It was issued to 1300 Private Giles Osgood. He joined the 1st Battalion, 22nd (Cheshire) Regiment on 23 January 1864 in Bolton, Hants, England. His age is given as 18 years and 10 months. He was 5 feet, 6¼ inches tall with a fair complexion, grey eyes and brown hair. His former trade was baker. It also states that his father (Henry) was living and that he had been living with his brother, William. He was single and attended the Church of England.

The 1st Battalion, 22nd Regiment had been stationed in Malta. It left there on 23 March 1866 aboard the SIMOON and arrived in New Brunswick on 18 April. The Commanding Officer was Lieutenant Colonel F. P. Harding. According to family information, Osgood had not been in Malta. Instead, he was part of a draft of reinforcements from England. Their ship landed in Saint John at 1:00 am on 4 May 1866. They moved on to Fredericton under the leadership of Sgt. Gregory, arriving there on 7 June. The Fenian Raid alarum had just ended and so the battalion had an uneventful stay in New Brunswick. However, they were here for Confederation in 1867.

Osgood's book records the receipt of his monthly pay for the years 1864 to 1869. He acknowledged the receipt of a clothing issues of a tunic, trowsers, boots, chako (hat) and other items. Osgood took his discharge from the army in Fredericton on 15 May 1869. The battalion was going to leave for Cork, Ireland on 26 May 1869. He was required to pay compensation as he had not finished the full term of his enlistment. Family information states that he paid £20 for this, quite a sizeable sum of money at the time. He did receive some money back from the army for boots and other clothing hat would have been issued in October. This, plus the £5/10/4 in his Savings Account would have offset this charge somewhat.

Why did he decide to leave the army? He had met a young lady, Margaret Ann Lafferty, and decided to stay in New Brunswick. They were married in Saint John on 2 May 1872. He was a baker there. Unfortunately, his place of employment and home were destroyed in the Great Fire of June 1877. At some time after this, he returned to Fredericton and was employed as the custodian at the University of New Brunswick.

They had five children, two sons and three daughters. Their youngest son, Giles, served as a Lieutenant in the 26th Battalion, CEF. He was killed in action on 15 August 1917 during the attack on Hill 70 and is commemorated on the Vimy Memorial. Giles Osgood died in 1907 and is buried Forest Hill Cemetery, Fredericton. His wife, Margaret, joined him in 1922.

This is a very rare document that sheds light on the life of a private soldier in Fredericton in the late 1860s. We are indebted to his family for donating it to the York-Sunbury Historical Society.
